# **Bristol Honey Show**

The annual Bee and Pollination Festival was held over the weekend of 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> September at the Bristol Botanical Gardens. As part of this festival the Bristol Beekeepers held their 90th annual honey show.



There were 20 classes in the show including honey, wax, art, mead and baking and the club reported over 110 entries. The tables looked great with an array of honey jars of different colours.

All the entries were so carefully prepared for the event.

The weekend was well attended by both beekeepers and the general public and along with the honey show there were lectures, displays, plants for sale, bumblebee conservation, seeds and many other things to see as well as the beautiful Botanical Gardens to look around. To top it all the weather was warm and dry which was a bonus.



Our very own Apiary Manager and Honey Judge, David Capon was awarded the Bristol Silver Queen Trophy for the highest number of overall points in the show. David won prizes for his medium honey, set honey, honey judged on taste alone, honey frame, cut comb, wax candles and wax blocks. While the trophy

had to stay with the Bristol club, David was awarded a Bristol Blue Glass plate to take home. Well done David!

# **Committee focus**

Over the next few months we will be raising awareness of our committee members by providing a short profile of individual members. This month:

#### **Garry Packer President**



I will have been president for two years in November and was previously Chair.

The president's main role is to

chair the AGM and host the summer BBQ, neither very onerous and it is a pleasure to support such a vibrant and diverse group of beekeepers.

I started beekeeping 8 years ago and had some successes and failures, certainly early on I was a bit too keen to knock down queen cells without understanding what was happening in the hive. I currently have two hives; one is doing really well and the other suffering a bit after it became queenless. Hopefully I will get that one back on track soon.

I really enjoy schools outreach and have just done an assembly at Locking Primary school talking about bees (as they have a swarm which has taken up residence in a tree). This makes a change from going into secondary schools and talking about the maths I use at work.

#### Adrian Wells – Swarm Liaison Officer

I've kept bees for quite a while, my interests in the subject include designing and making my own equipment, and boiling bee keeping down to the essentials, working with the bees at their level and generally enjoying the fact that you learn something new about them almost constantly. I tend to have strong views on many aspects of bee keeping and they are often controversial! My other interests tend to be somewhat more extreme, including caving, gliding, traction kiteing, kayaking, judo, aikido, kung fu, and anything to do with digital electronics! Bees offer a different pace and head-space to our modern lives; a hive in the garden is a very restful thing.

As the Swarm Liaison Officer [SLO], it's my responsibility to coordinate swarm capture within the area and to promote education among the public that come into contact with bees. Calls usually start with "Help! We've got bees!", so the first job is to calm the caller, and then

establish just what it is that they have. Few calls are about swarms, sometimes it's just a bush covered in foraging insects! Usually it's a nest of Tree Bumble Bees, sometimes wasps, but whatever the call, we calm and educate. When possible, we collect swarms, share them, and show novices just how easy it is.

I also sit on the committee, which mainly entails us trying to take the agenda as far off topic as possible before the Chair, the very capable Annabel Lewis, notices! That's not really true; but the committee covers a very wide agenda when it meets, discussing everything that needs to be done to ensure that the club serves its members. So the role of SLO is very rewarding on several fronts.

#### Improvers' course – basic – Rob Francis

For those of you who have been keeping bees for a year or so then The Improvers Course is a great way to hone your skills and develop an understanding of bees and beekeeping. The course itself is designed for 'apprentice beekeepers' and covers all you need to know to help gain confidence with bees and to make decisions about their care.

What members of the course often find most useful is sharing their experiences, the highs and lows, of the first steps in keeping bees. At the end of the course you can take the practical Basic Assessment (but this is not obligatory) which then enables you to study and take the BBKA modules.

The course will begin at the start of January and there are seven sessions through to the end of March. As yet there are no further details but if you are interested email me and let me know. More precise details about dates will be in the next newsletter.
