BBKA Queen Rearing Workshop – Dick Berry

I have been keeping bees for around fifteen years. I have about twenty hives on six sites stretching from National Trust Tyntesfield to Ashton on the edge of South Bristol. Most of my hives are nationals 14x12 but I do have a Beehause which is a type of long plastic hive which resides in our garden in Long Ashton, and I have just put a long hive onto Alderman Moore's allotment site in Ashton Vale which I am about to populate.

Queen rearing for me has always up until now been a bit hit or miss with my usual method being to place a queen cell into a nuc when available or to split my brood from the rest at the appropriate time. It has worked over the years in terms of volume of colonies but quality may have suffered due to which colonies decided to cooperate with the plan. I have not necessarily been increasing what I would consider to be my better bees.

Management of unruly hives has meant that I concentrate these at a gulag in Long Ashton away from everyone and I don't make nucs from these, although they can be very productive. It was time to look into being a bit more scientific about it. I bought a book but didn't get around to reading it. Queen rearing seemed to be a bit mysterious and was something other people did. I had previously bought in a few queens from the usual sources, but the bees did not always accept them or they only lasted a season then fizzled out.

I saw the opportunity to go on a course at Bridgwater and, as my bees were still in credit from a good honey harvest last year, they paid for me to go. The two-day course was excellent, delivered by Shaun Stevens who is a Master Beekeeper from Buckinghamshire. The course covered: queen rearing made simple; drones, life and

behavior; queen introduction and management of queen mating.

There was a good mix of theory and practical and I must say it was pitched just right to give a reasonably experienced beekeeper the confidence to have a go and take it further. We all had a go at grafting and at least gained an understanding of the process and minimal equipment required. We placed grafts into a hive overnight and a couple of these were accepted by the bees who started to draw wax around the cups.



We all also came away with a mini nuc populated with a cupful of nurse bees taken from the Quantock Apiary with either a queen cell taken from a Miller frame or a cup brought by Shaun from his

home apiary. We were told not to expect too much from these as it is late in the season but at least we were able to practice with real bees for next time.

Shaun has provided all the participants with copies of his slides in PDF format so we have material that can be passed on to others. We were asked to complete a feedback survey on returning home. I gave it full marks and feel confident and inspired to start next season actually picking which bees I want to increase. I have the knowledge, had a practice so see no reason not to make the best of it. If anyone is interested in more details I would be happy to pass on what I was told and shown.
