Monitoring Asian Hornet Traps

As you know we have been encouraging as many members as possible to set up AH monitoring traps, away from their apiaries, and to monitor them daily. We are all keen to preserve native species that may be trapped in the traps and some traps may need to be modified to ensure insects are not drowned.

Avon Beekeepers have supplied each branch with a gallon of attractant for trap monitoring (Trappit), which is being kept at the apiary. Members can collect a supply for use in monitoring traps by bringing a labelled jar to the apiary on a Sunday morning.

North Somerset Agricultural Show – Sandra Slater
